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Preface

This project is one result of my long term hobby, family history. The first major version of the information on descendants in the Krimmel family was collected from the late 1960s to the mid 1970s. At that time I could not conclusively identify the father of Samuel Krimmel. With new information from Kathy Addis and Pat Weiderman Crimmel, I have re-written the project to include John Krimmel and his family as well as adding much more filler about the early descendants of Samuel Krimmel. Much of this story is told in obituaries, other newspaper clippings and family letters that have been shared with me by many people. The 'core' collection of early obituaries is the one loaned to me by Grace (Kenney) Holmes, a collection started by her mother, Besse (Rhodes) Kenney. The later generations still reflect the fact that most of the information was gathered before the mid 1970s. Because of this, many young people are missing and I have not assigned numbers to some of them, beginning in generation six.

The results of my research have evolved through many stages into the present, electronic, form. As an electronic document, this presentation changes more rapidly than a traditional publication would. It can be presented in a variety of formats, styles and contents. Recent versions include a date on each page to help with identification.

What others have shared with me, I am glad to share with you in the hope that through continued sharing we will improve the scope, accuracy and documentation of our knowledge of the family.

The Krimmel Line

The purpose of this document is to record and document my research on my line of descent from John Krimmel and on the descendants his son Samuel.

1. John Krimmel. All of the Krimmels of Mifflin and Juniata counties seem to be descended from this man¹ but his origin is still unknown. One of the difficulties is that several spellings are found which may or may not be related. Although several men in the 1810 census of PA bore such names as Crommel, Cramel, Cromel, Krimer and Krimmel, I have not been able to identify a connection with them. This John Krimmel appears in the 1820 census of Fermanagh Township, Mifflin County², PA, where his family included 2 males under 10 [William and Daniel], 1 male 26-45 [John], 2 females under 10 [Susannah and ?], 1 female 26-45 [Elizabeth] and 1 female age 45 and up [a widowed mother?]. He was listed as engaged in manufacture.³

The 1830 census of Walker Twp., Mifflin County, shows the family with 1 male under 5 [David], 3 males age 5-10 [John, Samuel, and ?], 1 male age 10-15 [Daniel], 1 male age 15-20 [William], 1 male age 40-50 [John], 1 female under 5 [?], 1 female age 5-10 [Mary Ann?], 2 females age 10-15 [Susannah and ?], and 1 female age 30-40 [Elizabeth].⁴

The 1840 census of Walker Township, Juniata County, PA, page 205, lists the following two families:⁵

John Krimmel with 2 males under 5 [Henry and Alfred?], 1 male age 10-15 [David], 1 male 50-60 [John], 1 female age 5-10 [?] and 1 female 50-60 [Elizabeth].

William Crimmell with 1 male 20-30, 1 female under 5, and 1 female 20-30.

The names inserted in brackets with the census records above are merely guesses made in an attempt to fit the family listed below into the record and the result suggests that the family may have been larger than the group so far identified.

An index to the Walker Township tax records for 1842 lists William Krimmel, labourer, John Krimmel, mason, Daniel Krimmel, labourer, and Samuel Krimmel, labourer. In 1845, John

Krimmel is listed as a tenant and a mason.⁷

The 1850 census lists Elizabeth Krimmel and family without John so the presumption is that he died about 1845 or shortly thereafter. From the census records, we presume that John was born 1780 - 1790 and was married about 1810. Elizabeth was born about 1794 and thus significantly younger than her husband.

Although Samuel Krimmel has "always" been known to our family (I knew several people that had known him), the connection to John Krimmel took years of research. For me, the clinching proof of relationship is pieced together from family letters to Samuel and Hester Krimmel, which I have now and are quoted below, plus the discovery by Kathy Addis in 1994 of the death record of Susan Hostetler, d. 22 Feb. 1901, age 86 years, 6 mo., 13 d. which names her parents as John and Elizabeth Crimmell.

Pat Crimmel has collected the following information on this family. Her line of the family uses the spelling Crimmel which is the one used in many of the earlier county records as well. I've used her references internally and added any others as footnotes.

Children of John and Elizabeth Krimmel

- i. William Crimmel, b. ca. 1812, d. 8 March 1889¹⁰, m. Mary M Wetzler, 25 Apr. 1836, d. 1862.¹¹ The marriage is found in the Grooms Index at Juniata County Historical Society and in the Juniata Free Press, 10 May 1836. He married (2) Caroline Hostetler¹² about 1864. William is reported in the 1840, 1850 and 1860¹³ census records of Juniata County. In 1880 he is listed with wife Caroline and sons Thompson, age 19, and Orin, age 16.¹⁴
- ii. Susannah Crimmel, b. 10 May 1810 [probably corrected by the footnote below which indicates she was born in 1813], d. 22 Feb. 1901, buried at Thompsontown, Juniata Co., PA. She married John Hostetler about 1839. 15 Her birth, marriage and death information

- is from Amish and Amish Mennonite Genealogies by Gingrich. She was living with her sister Mary Ann Egler in the 1860 census of Walker Twp., Juniata Co. 16 17
- iii. Daniel Crimmel married Susan. He is on the tax lists of Juniata County for 1845 1851 and bought a house and lot in 1845. 18 19
- iv. John A. Crimmel, b. ca. 1819, married Sophia Heffly, Feb. 1849.²⁰
- 2. v. Samuel Krimmel. See below.
 - vi. Mary Ann Crimmel, 1824 1898, m. William M. Eagler (1832 -1913) about 1858. They are buried at Locust Run Cemetery, Old Section, row 21.²¹

 - viii. Henry Crimmel, b. ca. 1832, married Mary A. ____ about 1857. There is a Henry Crimmel in the 18th Militia (1862-1863) and one in the 171st Pennsylvania.²⁶ ²⁷
 - ix. Alfred Crimmel, b. 12 May 1834, Mexico, Juniata Co., PA., died 13 Feb. 1905, and buried

<u>Descendants of Jacob Hochstetler, the immigrant of 1736,</u> by Rev. Harvey Hostetler (1912, Brethren Publishing House, Elgin, IL), p. 761. They had three children, Anna E,., b. 2 Sept. 1840, James Walker, b. 15 Oct. 1844, and Catherine.

in lot 393, St. Marks Cemetery, Lewistown, Juniata Co. Pat Crimmel refers to an article in the Port Royal Times dated 23 Feb 1905 which stated that O. H. Crimmel²⁸ and wife attended the funeral of their uncle Alfred Crimmel of Lewistown and that he left a widow, five grown children and a brother in Illinois. She also has a copy of his obituary in The Daily Centinel of Lewistown, PA.

2. Samuel Krimmel. He was born in Mifflintown, PA. His birth date was 22 June 1822, according to his tombstone in Forest Hill Cemetery, Wyanet, IL. Although a note in his Bible gives his birth date as 15 June 1829, this does not seem consistent with other records, such as the census records. He died in Bureau Co., IL, on 22 April 1900.

He married Hester Dunn of Juniata Co., PA. She was born on 22 July 1822 and died 26 Aug. 1898 in Bureau Co., IL. She is also buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Wyanet, IL. They were married in Juniata County, 2 Jan. 1849.²⁹ The only other Krimmell marriage listed in the reference is that of John Krimmell to Sophia Heffly, 20 Feb. 1849. Most of the marriages listed in this reference are associated with a state, town or township, but these had none. Of potential future interest is the marriage of Thos. Dunn to Evalina Coltrider, both of Fayette, on 11 Oct. 1848, in the same reference.

The 1850 census of Juniata Co., PA, lists this family as follows:

According to the obituary of Hester Krimmel, they came to Illinois in 1857. The obituary of Anna Belle Krimmel Olds says they came to Illinois when she was 7 (2 Oct. 1856 - 1 Oct. 1857). This is further supported by later census records showing that they came between the births of Catherine and Emma.

I do not have the 1860 census record. The 1870 census of Bureau Co., IL, lists the family as living in Wyanet twp. on 15 Aug. 1870.

I have four obituaries or death notices for Hester Dunn Krimmel. These are from unidentified newspaper clippings.

"OBITUARY MRS. SAMUEL KRIMMEL

"Hester Dunn was born in Juniata county, Pennsylvania, July 22, 1822. In 1847, she married Mr. Samuel Krimmel. By this marriage there were seven children: six daughters and one son, six of whom are living. Mr. and Mrs. Krimmel, in 1857, moved to Illinois, where in the vicinity of Wyanet they have since resided.

"Unexpectedly, Friday, August 26, 1898, Mrs. Krimmel passed from the daily services of earthly life into the unseen future.

"She was a kind and affectionate mother, deeply interested in the welfare of her children. She

was respected and loved by the community in which she lived and leaves a whole circle of intimate friends and acquaintances to mourn for her.

"One who has known her intimately said of her: 'The best woman that ever lived.'

"Sunday noon a brief service for the family was held at the late residence. Then the silent, mournful procession bore her remains to the First Cong'l Church of Wyanet, where public services were held. The congregation of sympathising friends and neighbors crowded the audience room and vestry and vestibule.

"The services were concluded at beautiful Forest Hill Cemetery where the remains were laid to rest, Rev. R. Stetson, officiating."

"The funeral of Grandma Krimmel was held last Sunday in the Congregational Church; sermon by the pastor, singing by Messrs. Montgomery and Weaver, and Misses Mate Stryker and Hannah Isaacson of the M. E. Church. The deceased had apparently been in better health than usual for some time past, and with her husband spent Thursday, the 25th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Olds, in town, remarking while there that she hadn't felt as well in a long time. Friday a.m. she was about her household duties; did her ironing; then prepared beets for canning; in order to replenish her fire, she went to the wood house for a basket of cobs, and was found there by her husband a short time afterward; having fallen over her basket. She was still breathing, but unconscious. Mr. Gordon, the nearest neighbor, was summoned, and the son, James Krimmel, a little farther away. They got her to the house, but she ceased breathing very soon. Apoplexy was the cause of death. She was a native of Pennsylvania and was seventy-six years of age. There were several children in the family, four daughters and one son being settled within a few miles of the old home. Mrs. Booth, of Providence, Mrs. Stinson, of Buda, Mrs. Rhodes and James Krimmel, at Union, four miles south, and Mrs. J. H. Olds, of Wyanet. These with their families were all present at the funeral, which was very largely attended. She leaves a large circle of friends and acquaintances, who sympathize with the aged husband and other relatives in their affliction. The remains were interred in Forest Hill Cemetery. -- B.C. Republican."

"Mr. and Mrs. Lucius Rhodes and Mr. and Mrs. David Booth drove to Peoria last Friday and had been in the city but about three hours when they received a telegram announcing the death of their mother, Mrs. Samuel Krimmel, which occurred at her residence near Union about 11 o'clock Friday forenoon. She was about 76 years of age, leaves a husband, five daughters and one son to mourn her sudden departure."

"Mrs. Hester Krimmel"³¹

"Mrs. Hester Krimmel, nee Dunn, died suddenly at her home, three miles south of Wyanet, Friday, August 26, 1898.

"She was born in Juniata county, Pa., July 22, 1822. In 1847 she became the wife of Samuel Krimmel. In 1857, the moved to Bureau county, where they have since resided.

"She left a husband and six children, sixteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren to mourn their loss. Mrs. Krimmel was in good health up to the time of her death.

"Mrs. Krimmel preserved her physical health to a remarkable degree, and long after ordinary women are considered old she was erect, full of life and vigor and well preserved for one who had been through so many labors and cares of life. She was one of the most genial and gracious of women, patient and systematic, taking matters as easy as if time existed by her permission.

"The funeral services were held in the Congregational Church at Wyanet Sunday afternoon, August 28. The church was filled by loving friends. Rev. Stetson conducted the services, after which she was followed to Forest Hill cemetery where she was quietly laid to rest in mortal's last resting place.

A FRIEND

No lingering clouds around her fireside hung Nor entered her home to stay Her shining spirit would pass them by, And send them on their way.

She walked in pureness, like the night Of stormless winds and starlit skies. And all that was love and brightness We met in her beaming eyes.

In the long path she left behind, She led a life of soul sincere; Stood firm at the wheel until the last, In action faithful, in honor clear.

Her aim was of the highest mind;
To break no promise, serve faithful to the end;
Leave behind her deeds of goodness;
Gain no worldly title, but lose no friend.

Her moral heart was as pure as the lily,
And bravely her life of health was sped;
With a long remembrance that she lived,
Her name shall be written with the dead.
And now in the silent earth reclines her clay,
That clay where once such ambition beam'd
Lies dormant in its grave alone,
Worthy and waiting to be redeemed.

To part with such a soul as this, Seems to us a vain endeavor; Yet, we know the mortal cares of life

Are past, with her, forever.

[This unattributed poem has some elements of "She Walks in Beauty" by Lord Byron but is not the same]

Family tradition states that Hester Dunn Krimmel was one-quarter Cherokee.³² This tradition was suppressed by certain members of the family (especially, it is said, by Aunt Myra Olds) and I have been unable to verify it. (The 1790 census of Pa. lists a Thomas Dunn (red) and also a Thomas Dunn (black). What is the significance of this?)

I have a few family letters which provide some clues to the ancestry of Samuel Krimmel and (perhaps) Hester Dunn. He was probably of German descent. In fact, both he and his wife are said to have been able to speak German. "I never heard of any other relatives of Samuel Krimmel or Hester Dunn. I know that Samuel Krimmel was born in Mifflintown, Juanita County, Penn. June 22, 1822. He died April 22, 1900 east of Providence. His mother was German. Hester Dunn as born in Penn. July 17 1822 -- died August 26, 1898, at her house three miles south of Wyanet. She probably was of German descent as both she and her husband spoke the language. I do have Hester Krimmel's obituary and note that she was born in **JUNIATA** Co. Penn. and this is the spelling used."

On 29 Nov. 1896, Mrs. Amil E. Lang of Lewistown, Mifflin Co., Pa., wrote to "respected Uncle" Samuel Krimmel of Wyanet, Ill., and described herself as Hester, daughter of his brother Daniel and mentions her uncle John, brother Tomie, her mother (dead 15 years), her own three girls and two boys, and uncle Henry. Her oldest son, Tomie, living in Altoona, "brakes on the road" and has one little girl. She called her oldest girl Susan and she is married to a Mr. Powell and lives in Millerstown. The two children still at home are a boy, Jasie (?), and a girl, Dasie (?). The youngest girl is dead.

Mrs. Susan Hostetler of Thompsontown, Pa., begins her letters to Samuel Krimmel "Dear Brother and Sister". She mentions brother Alford and "Sister Mary Ann Eagler". A letter to Samuel's daughter Addie Stinson, from this same "Aunt Susan" also mentions "sister Mary Ann". She mentions "sister Hettie" who seems to be Hester Krimmel. Susan Hostetler mentions a son James. She addresses Addie Stinson as "my dear niece". It was the discovery, by Kathy Addis, of the death record of this Susan Hostetler, naming her parents, that conclusively forged the link to her parents, John and Elizabeth Krimmel.

I have an old list of deaths in the Krimmel family. It is written in pencil, author unknown:

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"Mother Krimmel died August the 26, 1898 Anna Krimmel died Sept. the 27, 1898 Father Krimmel died April the 22 1900 Bertha Estella Booth died December the 8 1883"

"The funeral of Mr. Samuel Krimmel was held Tuesday p.m. from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Rhodes, two miles south of Providence, and very largely attended -- Rev. Stetson officiating. The deceased had been in feeble health for some time, and about six weeks ago had a stroke of paralysis, which rendered him perfectly helpless until his death on Sunday night. He was born in Pennsylvania seventy-seven years and ten months ago, had been a resident of Bureau county for over forty years, most of the time living on his farm some four miles south of town, where his wife died the 26th of August 1898; since which time he has made his home with Mrs. Rhodes, besides whom he leaves three other daughters, Mrs. Stinson and Mrs. Foster of Buda, and Mrs. J. H. Olds, of Wyanet; and one son, Mr. James Krimmel, four and one-half miles south of town, and a large number of grandchildren and other friends, to mourn his departure. His children were all present at the funeral, also Mr. and Mrs. Bryant Olds, of Princeton. The interment was in the family lot at Forest Hill cemetery. The family have the sympathy of many friends in their sorrow."

"Deaths: Samuel Krimmel, Providence, d. Apr. 22, age 77."34

"The Wyanet correspondent in speaking last week of the children of Mr. Kimmel [sic] must have forgotten that Mrs. Daniel [sic] Booth of Providence is also a daughter." ³⁵

Bryant Olds told the story of his grandpa Krimmel who would not sleep in the house when his wife was away. He slept in the barn with the horses (for company?).³⁶

On 23 Feb. 1974, I wrote Robert Johnson of Wyanet because he was caretaker of the cemetery there and I had noticed, a few years earlier, that Samuel Krimmel's grave was decorated with a flag for Memorial Day and wondered why. He replied:

"Burial in Lot #271

"b. June 22, 1822 Mr. Samuel Krimmel, died 22 April 1900, buried 24 April 1900, age 77 yrs. 10 da [? sic], last residence Tiskilwa.

"b. July 22, 1822 Mrs. Samuel Krimmel, died 26 Aug. 1898, buried 28 Aug., 1898, age 76 yrs, 1 m. 4 da, last residence Indiantown.

"James Krimmel bought lot #271 the 2nd day of Sept. A. D. 1898 and I. D. Hull was President of Wyanet and B. S. Edwards being Clerk of Village. Perpetual care on lot was paid 5-3-1927 by whom I cannot find.

"I asked Kenneth Towne who takes care of V.F. W records and they have no record of any Armed Service. Kenney thought maybe when they mowed the cemetery that someone moved the decoration and forgot to put Flag back at proper grave. If you know that we was in service, I know Kenney Towne would be glad to know and they would decorate the grave every Decoration Day." ³⁷

GENERATION THREE

3. Ann a Belle Krimmel. Anna Belle Krimmel, daughter of Samuel and Hester (Dunn) Krimmel, was born 2 Oct. 1849 in Juniata Co., Pa., and died 21 May 1937 at her home in Bureau County, IL.

On 15 April 1869, in Bureau County, she married John Hixon Olds who was born in Princeton, IL, on 21 May 1847 and died 8 July 1901. They are buried in the Forest Hill Cemetery, Wyanet, IL.

Further details of her life and family come from her obituary. It is dated Thursday, May 27, 1937.³⁹

"Anna Belle Olds, 88, Summoned at Her Home Here Friday "A member of pioneer family Bureau County; Funeral Services on Monday.

"Mrs. Anna Belle Krimmell Olds, 88, one of the early settlers of Bureau County, and a lifelong resident, passed away in peace at the close of day Friday, May 21st. She had been confined to her home and bed since last July, but even so, she had an ever-glowing spirit of contentment.

"Funeral services were conducted at her home on Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with the Rev. Mr. H. L. Brett pastor of the Wyanet Methodist Episcopal church, officiating. Two of her favorite songs, "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere", and "City Foursquare" were sung by Mrs. Elmer Anthony and Mrs. Earl Mount. The pall bearers were Earl Mount, Glenn Mosher, C. F. Winterberg, A. E. Bergh, Elmer Anthony, Earl Jegglie. The pall bearers with the exception of Mr. Jegglie, were sons of her old friends.

"Interment was made in Forest Hill Cemetery.

"Anna Belle Krimmell was born on October 2, 1849, in Mifflintown, Pa., and was the oldest daughter of Samuel and Hester Krimmell. When seven years of age she came with her parents to Illinois who settled in the vicinity of Tiskilwa. Here she spent her girlhood, attending the public schools and the Tiskilwa high school, and the Methodist Church.

"The deceased was married to John H. Olds on April 15, 1869, and they settled on a farm nearby Tiskilwa and four miles south of Wyanet, where they made their home for a number of years, later moving to Wyanet. Mr. Olds here built the residence known as the Larson home and still later the present place where they continued to live. Mrs. Olds had lived in the present house for 44 years. Mr. Olds passed away on July 8, 1901, thirty-six years ago. Since that time her daughter and husband, Mr. and Mrs. George Dahl, have made their home with her almost continually.

"To Mr. and Mrs. Olds were born eight children -- Bryant Olds, Howard Olds, Mrs. Elmer Sapp, all deceased, Mrs. M. G. Whitney of Cour d'Alene, Idaho, Guy M. Olds, deceased, Mrs. C. J. Webster, of Portland, Ore., John C. Olds, deceased, and Mrs. George C. Dahl of Wyanet.

"Mrs. Olds was the last of a pioneer family, her parents and brothers and sisters have all preceded her in death -- James Krimmel, Mrs. Lucius Rhodes, Mrs. David Booth, Mrs. Geo. Stinson and Mrs. Stephen Foster.

"Besides the three daughters mentioned, Mrs. Olds leaves the following grandchildren, Mrs. Warner Van Aken of Cold Water, Mich., Milford Olds and Austin Olds, of Chicago, Robert Olds of Newark, Ohio, Justin Olds of Marseilles, Bernadine Olds of Wyanet, Maxine Whitney and Merrill Whitney of Cour d'Alene, Idaho, Mrs. Clyde Campbell and Elizabeth Olds, Wyanet.

"There are nine great grandchildren, Marjory Van Aken, Bryant Van Aken and Elmer Van Aken, Charles Bryant Olds, Billy Whitney, Bobby Whitney, Danny Olds, Jackie Olds and Dickie Olds.

"Mrs. Olds was taken sick in July of last year and has been confined to the house and bed practically the entire period since that date, until the time of her death on Friday evening, May 21st 1937. She slipped peacefully away just at the close of day just as the sun was going down, having reached the advanced age of eighty-eight years. Throughout the recent months she endured much suffering with declining strength, but through it all constantly displayed a quiet and patient spirit so typical of her character. In these months she was most faithfully ministered to by her daughter Mrs. George Dahl. All that love and devotion could do was gladly done to make her comfortable and contented.

"The passing of Mrs. Olds is the breaking of another link that binds this generation to the pioneers, for Mr. and Mrs. Olds made their home and spent their lives in this vicinity of Bureau County. As these pass from amongst [us,] we sense a loss for their struggles and fortitude and

sturdy uprightness to worthy ideals were the very foundations that made this great section of our land what it is today. We owe a debt to them and trust that we as their successors may be like them, courageous and faithful in our day.

"Mrs. Olds was one of those quiet, unassuming personalities who go about life's duties with a faithfulness which is highly commendable. She ministered well to the cares of her household and in her quiet way forgot not to minister to those who were in need, and thus carried on a helpful ministry.

"She will be missed by a large number of friends for to know her was to love her. Her memory will be with her own loved ones who remain as a sweet fragrance.

"Say not goodbye but rather bid me good morning in God's better land.

Her death record is filed in the Bureau County Courthouse in Princeton, IL. It gives her father as Samuel Krimmel, b. Mifflintown, PA, and her mother as Hester Dunn, b. PA. She was born 2 Oct. 1849 in Mifflintown, PA, and died 31 (according to my notes, although this date is incorrect) May 1937. The cause of death was cerebral hemorrhage.

I have her Bible, printed in New York by the American Bible Society in 1872. It is inscribed "From John H. Olds to his beloved wife Anna Bell Olds, Wyanet, January 1st, 1873". The marriages, births, and deaths of the family are recorded in it, up to the time of her own death, beginning with herself and her husband. In this record, her name is spelled Anna Bell Crimmel. This Bible is the source of the following list.

5. James Lock Krimmel. James Lock Krimmel, son of Samuel and Hester (Dunn) Krimmel, was born 22 Aug. 1853 and died 4 April 1932 in Bureau Co., IL, at the age of 78 y., 7 m. 13 d. 45 His heirs at law were his sisters Kate Rhodes, Emma Booth, Anna Belle Olds, Roy Maynard as executor of the will of Fannie Foster, and A. G. Stinson as administrator of the estate of Addie Stinson.

James Krimmel married (first), in 1878, Anna K. Wyatt. They had no children (see obituary quoted below). She died 20 Sept. 1898 (according to his obituary). The list of deaths quoted in the section on Samuel and Hester Krimmel gives this date as 27 Sept. 1898. Her tombstone in

Forest Hill Cemetery, Wyanet, IL, reads "Ann E., wife of James L. Krimmel, born Apr. 8, 1855, died Sept 27, 1898". They raised a niece, Maude Kinneman, who married Roy Maynard. 46

"The following was told to Myrtle and Nevin Arnold by Lester Whited of Buda, Ill. who remembers Jim Krimmel, brother of Annabelle Olds, Emma Booth, Catharine Rhodes and Fannie Foster. 'Jim Krimmel's first wife was a Wyatt. Jim's second wife whose name was Decker had a daughter Mabel who married Elmer Booth. Jim Krimmel and Harry Kinneman married sisters. Harry Kinneman was Lester Whited's grand father. Jim Krimmel had a good team of horses and knew how to drive them'.

"Evidently the Krimmels had a way with horses as the above infers. I know my great-grandmother, Fannie Krimmel Foster was 'horse crazy'".⁴⁷

"In my hurried note I neglected to explain who Myrtle and Nevin Arnold are as you asked. Nevin is my grandfather (Chas. Arnold)'s younger brother. They live right in back of us so Aunt Myrtle & I have a great time running back and forth with bits of genealogical info. that we discover."

James Krimmel married (second), in 1900, Mrs. Helen (Mayhew) Decker who was born in Providence, IL., on 27 Oct. 1855 and died in Tiskilwa, IL, on 1 Dec. 1922.⁴⁹ (See her obituary below for further information.) James, Helen, and their son Howard are buried in the older section of Mt. Bloom Cemetery, Tiskilwa, IL, where the dates on the tombstones show years only: Krimmel: James L. 1853-1932; J. Howard, 1900-1921; Mother, 1855-1922.⁵⁰

James Crimmel of Indiantown was on the list of petit jurors in 1909.⁵¹

The following obituary is from an unidentified newspaper clipping.

"JAMES KRIMMEL

"James Krimmel, 78, passed away at his home in Tiskilwa, April 4, after a prolonged illness. He came from his native state, Pennsylvania, with his parents when he was a little child and had been a lifelong resident of Tiskilwa.

"Mr. Krimmel was married to Anna K. Wyatt in 1878. They had no children but raised Mrs. Roy Maynard as their daughter. Mrs. Krimmel passed away September 20, 1898. His second marriage was to Helen Decker in 1900. They had one son, Howard, who met a tragic death by drowning May 25, 1921, just after his graduation from High School. Mr. Krimmel was again bereaved when his wife passed away December 1, 1922.

"The life work of Mr. Krimmel was farming and he was very successful in that calling. For fifteen years he ran the Hinman farm of 600 acres. Later he moved to a smaller place and twelve years ago he retired to locate in the village. He was highly respected in the community where he had a wide circle of friends.

"Besides the foster daughter, Mr. Krimmel is survived by five sisters: Mrs. Kate Rhodes and Mrs. Emma Booth of Tiskilwa, Mrs. Annabelle Olds, of Wyanet; Mrs. Adelaide Stinson and Mrs. Fannie Foster, of Buda. It is a remarkable record that in this family of one brother and five sisters, now ranging in age from 68 to 82 this is the first break in the circle.

"Rev. E. B. Cushing, of Princeton, conducted the funeral services at the home April 6. Music was furnished by Mrs. Harry Cushing and Mrs. Ed Wilson who sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Nearer, Still Nearer". The bearers were nephews: Alden Stinson, Elmer Booth, Harry Booth, John C. Olds, Harvey Landis and Roy Maynard. Burial was in the family lot in Mount Bloom Cemetery."

I have no further information on James Krimmel's first wife, but the following obituary provides material on the family of Mrs. Helen Krimmel.⁵²

"Mrs. James Krimmel

"Helen Mayhew, daughter of Helen Reid and Holmes Mayhew was born in Providence, Illinois, October 27, 1855 and died at the family residence in Tiskilwa, Illinois, December 1, 1922. Her parents were among the pioneers of Indiantown township and Helen lived the life of an ordinary farmer's daughter, attending the district and high schools and afterwards becoming a teacher in the rural schools.

"In 1877 she was married to Clarence Decker and lived some years in Bradford, Illinois, and later in Chicago, until the death of Mr. Decker. To this union two daughters were born Mrs. Fred Hanson, of Kasber, Illinois, and Mrs. Elmer Booth, of Buda, Illinois. In 1900 Mrs. Decker was united in marriage to James Krimmel and to them was born one son, Howard, a young man of unusual promise, who passed away as a result of a sad drowning accident in May, 1921.

"At the time of her death, she was a member of the Congregational church of Providence, Illinois, having united with that church probably under the ministrations of Rev. Paddock, about 40 years ago. She was a church member and she lived a christian life. Her domestic relations as the head of two households have been of the purest and highest type of the American wife and mother and on the death of her only son, just on the eve of his graduation from the high school, she looked to God for strength and guidance and found her comfort in continuing to be active and interested in the life of her town.

"She was a charter member of the Indiantown Household Science club, and will be greatly missed from that organization in which she took an active part.

"Her husband and two daughters mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother. Her brother, Howard, of Bradford, and four grandchildren, Clarence and George Hanson, Fred and Helen

Booth and a large circle of loving friends will long remember the good sister, the dear grandmother and the genial, kindly friend.

"To those who mourn can any words of more comfort and cheer be spoken than those pronounced by Rev. E. B. Cushing, who conducted the funeral services at the late residence of the deceased. "If a man dies, shall he live again?" The question was asked 3000 years ago and our Savior came and answered it: "He that liveth and believeth in Me shall never die." And so as we think of the sorrowful husband and children, we can perhaps turn our thots from mourning to thots of the glad meeting beyond the grave.

"At the funeral services, the music was beautifully rendered by Mrs. E. M. Wilson and Mrs. Harry Cushing, with Mrs. Cora VanDevort at the piano, the songs being: "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Asleep in Jesus".

6. Catherine Malinda Krimmel. Catherine (or in later records, Katherine) Malinda Krimmel, daughter of Samuel and Hester (Dunn) Krimmel, was born in Pennsylvania on 14 March 1856. She died at her home in Tiskilwa, IL, at 2:00 a.m. on the morning of Monday, 3 May 1937.

On 30 March 1880, she married Lucius A. Rhodes, the son of Crawford J. and Elizabeth (Booth) Rhodes. He was born near Providence, IL, on 12 Jan. 1857 and died at his home in Tiskilwa on 26 April 1928.

The following newspaper clippings provide further information on their lives and family.

"Lucien Rhodes died Thursday morning, not having recovered consciousness after a stroke. Rev. E. B. Cushing assisted by Rev. Bohn officiated at the services at the home Saturday afternoon. There was a large attendance of friends who had known Mr. Rhodes for many years on the farm and in town and he will be missed by many. Among those who attended were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brutcher and Mr. and Mrs. William Rhodes, of Peoria. The remains were laid to rest in the new addition to Mt. Bloom, north of the road."

[The following is from the Tiskilwa Chief, May 2, 1928]

"Lucius Rhodes, son of Crawford J. and Elizabeth Booth Rhodes, was born on the old homestead farm, four miles southeast of Providence, on January 12, 1857, and passed away at his home in Tiskilwa on April 26, 1928, at the age of 71 years and 3 months. His illness was very brief. He sustained a stroke of apoplexy, Tuesday afternoon, and, although everything was done for him that skillful and loving hands could do, he never regained consciousness, but passed away in the early hours of Thursday morning.

"Mr. Rhodes passed his youth and early manhood on the old home farm and attended school at Dorr Hill and Providence. March 30, 1880, he was married to Miss Katherine Krimmel, and for 40 years they lived in various farm homes, all within a radius of ten miles of Tiskilwa. In January, 1920, they retired from active farm life and moved to Tiskilwa, which has since been their home.

"Mr. Rhodes was one of the most quiet and unassuming of men, but he possessed just those sterling qualities that make for good citizenship and form the bone and sinew of our nation. He served as school director for a number of terms, and at the time of his death was one of the trustees of the Providence Cemetery Association. He was truly a good man, including all the plain and comprehensive goodness that the term may imply. He was a loving husband and father, a kind neighbor, a loyal friend, and as a citizen was always on the side of right. "Funeral service will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 p.m. at the Tiskilwa home with Rev. Nunemaker in charge. Burial will be in Mt. Boom cemetery."

"Mrs. Katherine Rhodes passed away at her home, Monday morning at 1:50 a.m., aged 81 years. Mrs. Rhodes has been in failing health for several years but it was not until the last two weeks that her condition became serious and she was confined to her bed.

On 21 Nov. 1878, she married David Booth, son of Joseph and Hannah Booth. He was born in Providence, IL, on 28 Oct. 1855 and died 5 May 1927. David Booth, his parents, his wife, and his two oldest children are buried at Oak Hill Cemetery, Providence, IL.

"Providence Native Son Passes

"David Booth, son of Joseph and Hannah Booth, was born in Providence, Illinois, October 28, 1855. He was married to Mary Emma Krimmel, November 21, 1878. To this union three children were born, one daughter, Bertha E., who departed this life December 8, 1883, and two sons, Elmer Dewayne and James Harold, both of whom live in Providence community. He followed the occupation of farming his entire life until he retired a few years ago, making his home since in Tiskilwa. His illness was of about a month's duration, and although everything was done that could be by the most skillful medical and surgical attention, he passed away May 5, 1927, at the age of 71 years, 6 months and 7 days. During his residence on the farm he and Mrs. Booth were regular attendants and supporters of the Providence Congregational Church.

"He was the youngest son in a family of eight children, four boys and four girls. Two of these are yet living; Mrs. Martha Brown, Washington, Iowa, and W. S. Booth, Princeton, Illinois. Besides these, remaining are his wife, two sons and two grandchildren.

"Mr. Booth readily made friends, by whom he was very highly esteemed. He was companionable, jovial in his disposition, possessing a keen sense of wit, even tempered. He was a hard working man, and very greatly devoted to his wife and children, and in their loss they have the sincere sympathy of the community."

"Her illness was of many months duration, and although everything possible was done by kind and loving hands to ease her suffering, she passed away at her home in Tiskilwa, March 11, 1937, age 79 years and 11 days.

"The funeral was held Wed. afternoon from the Methodist church with the service in charge of the pastor, Rev. F. D. Menze."

"STEPHEN H. FOSTER⁶⁰

"Stephen H. Foster, son of Stephen H. and Sarah Browning Foster, was born in Macon Township, Bureau County, Illinois, Sept. 4, 1864. He grew up on the farm, attended the public school of his district and the High School of Buda. One year while quite a young man he spent in Colorado.

"On February 27, 1890, he was married to Miss Fannie Krimmel. For 16 years they lived on the farm and two daughters came to bless their home -- Ethel Maude, now Mrs. Harry Bangston, and Sarah Hester, now Mrs. Charles Arnold. In 1905, Mr. Foster was converted and joined the Congregational church under the pastorate of Rev. W. J. Stewart. He loved the church and was devoted to its service. Since 1915, he has served continuously as a trustee and a more efficient officer the church never had. Stephen Foster was known and honored for his integrity and faithfullness of character as citizen and Christian.

"After prolonged illness and much suffering, he died in his home in Buda, May 27, 1927, aged 62 years, 8 months and 19 days. Besides his beloved wife and daughters, he leaves one brother, George Foster, of Colorado Springs, Colorado; one sister, Mrs. Eunice Knipple of Buda and 5 grandchildren. "Buda, Nov. 30. L. A. Zearing, appraiser in the matter of the inheritance tax relative to the estate of Stephen H. Foster, deceased, of Buda, has filed his report. The total estate as found by the appraiser was \$99,377.34 made up as follows:

"Real estate \$69,659; chattel property \$4,006.25; notes, stocks and bonds \$25,721.09. The total deduction on account of debts and cost of administration was estimated to be \$6511.18, leaving the net value of the estate to be \$92,866.16. Deceased left his widow, Fannie Foster, and two daughters, Ethel Bangston, and Sadie Arnold as his only heirs. The amount of the inheritance tax amounted to \$657.32 distributed as follows: the widow pays \$285.96; Ethel Bangton [sic] \$164.27 and Sadie Arnold \$207.09."

"PROBATE WILL IN BUREAU CO. COURT"

"Princeton, Ill., June 6. -- (Special) -- The will of Stephen H. Foster, a retired farmer and a life long citizen of Buda, has just been admitted to probate in the county court of Bureau county. He left Fannie Foster, his widow, and Ethel Bangston and Sadie Arnold, his daughters, as his only heirs-at-law. The widow and two daughters entered their written appearance and consented to the immediate probate of the will. Mr. Foster at the time of his death was the owner of 320 acres of land in Colorado and 400 acres of land in Bureau county and his household goods, chattel property, notes, stocks, bonds, and other personal securities is estimated to be worth \$25,000.

"By the terms of the will his wife is given all the household goods, notes, stocks and other securities absolutely and the homestead residence in Buda besides an annuity of \$400 from each of the two daughters. Ethel Gangston (sic), his daughter, is given 160 acres of land in Colorado and 160 acres of Bureau county land. Sadie Arnold is given 160 acres of land in Colorado and 240 acres of Bureau county land. His widow, Fannie Foster, is appointed executrix of the will without bond."

"MRS. FANNIE FOSTER

"Mrs. Fannie Foster, daughter of Samuel and Hester Krimmel, was born near Tiskilwa, Illinois, August 24, 1864, and passed away in her home November 1, 1935, after a short illness, at the age of 71 years, 2 months and 8 days.

"She spent her girlhood in the vicinity of her birth, and on February 27, 1890, was married to Stephen H. Foster. They established their home on the Foster homestead south of town and remained there until September 1906 when they moved to Buda to the home where she resided the remainder of her life.

"Mr. and Mrs. Foster were the parents of two daughters, Ethel Maude, now Mrs. Harry

Bangston of Buda; and Sarah Hester, now Mrs. Charles Arnold of Buda; who with ten grandchildren, survive her. Bryant Olds was one of those who gave recitations at a public program in April, 1892.⁶⁷

In Dec. 1962, Anna Olds told me how she and Bryant first met. The Schmidts had a young horse that they were teaching to pull a cart in single harness. When this horse decided they had gone far enough from home, she would stop and had to be lead to start again. It was necessary to mount the moving cart from the rear. One day when Anna was doing this (with her sister Ida in the cart), Bryant Olds came by and said "Do you girls need any help?". Anna said "No". That was her future husband.

The Wyanet Bugle of 3 Nov. 1893 contains the following: "WEDDED"

"Miss Anna Schmidt was married to Bryant Olds, Wednesday, November 1st, at high noon, at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Schmidt, north of town. Rev. Bannon, of Princeton, performed the marriage ceremony. Miss Emma Hess, of Chicago, cousin of the bride, and Mr. Guy Olds, brother of the groom, were the attendants. The bride wore a lovely pink silk, and the groom wore the conventional black. There were about fifty guests present, all relatives, and a royal dinner was served. Many presents were received. The worthy young couple occupy the home prepared by the groom, and everything points to a happy life for them, which they deserve."

"Last Saturday morning lightning struck Bryant Old's [sic] home, knocking off the chimney and going through the south side and through the west side tearing off siding and doing internal injuries to the plastering. Mrs. Olds and baby had a very narrow escape as they were alone in the house at the time; they got quite a shaking up." 68

"Mrs. Bryant Olds and son expect to leave Wyanet next Monday for their new home in Elreno, Oklahoma. Mrs. Olds will leave many friends in Wyanet who will miss her, but Wyanet's loss will be Elreno's gain." 69

"Prominent Wyanet Citizen Summoned by Call of Death"

"Sorrow laid a heavy hand upon the hearts of the Wyanet Community when news came last Saturday night that death had claimed another of its sons. Bryant Olds departed this life at the home of his son, Milford Olds, in Chicago that evening. After an illness of four long months

duration, nature whom he so admired and loved, gathered his weary form to her bosom. He had lived his entire life in Bureau County except for two years spent in the west and he became endeared to all who knew him, death served to impress, how deeply.

"During all his life he found his greatest enjoyment in doing for others and there are few among us left behind him who have not at some time, in some way felt our burdens lightened by his helping hand. Generous almost to a fault, selfishness had no part in his make up and were everyone for whom he has done some loving kindness to pause but an instant beside his bier the procession would indeed be an impressive tribute to the greatness of his kindly heart.

"Mr. Olds was a man of strong personality and deep feeling. He possessed an unusually alert mentality and through wide range, close observation and careful thought he became essentially well educated. He was a rare man in that he was fearless in his thinking and willing to accept the logical conclusions of his thoughts whether along previously accepted lines or not. He investigated, he studied, he thought and he separated the gold from the dross in the crucible of his brain. Nature was his temple to do good his religion.

"Deepest sympathy was expressed for his family who must feel his loss mostly (sic) keenly. Taken as he was in the prime of his active life his absence will be all the more keenly felt. As a son he was a staff and a support, as a husband a protector and a shield, as father the embodiment of a self sacrificing love. He possessed the qualities of leadership and he will continue to live in the minds of his family and exert a dominant influence upon their lives. The world is better always for such a man having lived.

"Bryant Olds, a son of John Hixon and Annabelle Krimmel Olds, was the oldest of eight children, three of whom, Howard, Guy M., and Edna Olds Sapp passed on before him. He was born on a farm three miles south of Wyanet on February 17,1870. He lived all his life within a radius of but a few miles of the place of his birth with the exception of two years spent in the west.

"He attended the public schools in and near Wyanet and later attended business college at Dixon, Ill. On November 1, 1893, he was joined in marriage with Anna Schmidt, of Wyanet, and at the time was engaged in the hardware business with his father. In 1895 he engaged in the windmill and pump business in Princet on where he remained until he removed to Oklaho ma in 1902.

"Upon his return to Bureau County in 1904 he took up farming which vocation he followed to his death.

"He is survived by his wife, Anna, three sons, Milford Hixon and Austin Bryant, of Chicago, Robert Lee at home, and one grandson, Charles Bryant, of Chicago, his mother, Mrs. Annabelle Olds living in Wyanet, one brother, John C., of Wyanet, and three sisters, Blanche, now Mrs. Monroe G. Whitney, of Couer d'Alene, Idaho; Lucy, now Mrs. Charles J. Webster, of Portland, Ore., and Myra, now Mrs. George C. Dahl, of Wyanet.

"The funeral service at the former home of the deceased on Tuesday afternoon was attended by a great number of friends and neighbors. Indeed, considering the inclemency of the weather it was a remarkable gathering.

"Mr. R. O. Ferrell, a Chicago lawyer, college mate of Milford Olds, after the reading of a portion of the obituary, spoke eloquently of his love for and sympathetic understanding of the

mind of the deceased, and read the poem, "Thanatopsis" by William Cullen Bryant.

"Rev. W. E. Gross completed the reading of the obituary and spoke briefly of the high regard of the community and expressed their sorrow and sympathy for the bereaved. At the outset of the service Mr. B. L. Hudson sang as a solo, "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere".

"The concluding service in the cemetery was impressive, the more beautiful because of the vast quantity and richness of the floral offerings."

Anna Olds lived as a widow for 37 years in Chicago and Wyanet, IL. By the time of her death in 1966, the style of obituaries had changed from that used for so many of the earlier members of this family record.

"Death Takes Mrs. Anna Olds"

"WYANET -- Mrs. Anna Olds, 92, life long resident of the Wyanet community, died at her home at 4:50 p.m. Sunday after a three year illness.

"Mrs. Olds was born Nov. 18, 1874, in a log cabin at Searles Ridge, the daughter of William and Wilhelmine Hopp Schmidt. She was married to Bryant Olds at Wyanet Nov. 1, 1893, and he preceded her in death. She was a member of the Methodist Church, Order of Eastern Star, and the Indian Township Household Science Club.

"Surviving are three sons, Milford of Wyanet, Austin of Sheffield, Robert of Olney; three grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

"Funeral services will be held at the Sutley-Wilkey Funeral Home at 2 p.m., Wednesday. The Rev. Albert E. Ihne will officiate and interment will be in the Forest Hill Cemetery.

"Friends may call at the funeral home, 6 to 9 p.m., Tuesday."

A funeral card printed in memory of Mrs. Anna Olds (18 Nov. 1874 - 11 Dec. 1966) lists the pall bearers as: Eugene Cook, Henry Frielingdorf, Wendell Morse, Cecil Wilson, Ronald Peterson, and John Scharff.

The name of Howard Olds, along with Ora. R. Everett and John M. Wyatt, was on the "Women's Specimen Ballot" for the Primary Election, Village of Wyanet, Bureau County, Illinois, Tuesday, March 11, 1919. The three names were for members of the board of trustees and voters

"Aunt Ev", as I called her, is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Wyanet, IL. She lived in a large house on an adjacent corner of the same block that my grandmother lived on and my early memories are that there were no other houses on the block.

"Spends entire life in Bureau County; Former Fire Dept. Chief" (Special to Star-Courier)

"Wyanet, July 13. -- Howard Olds, one of our oldest and best known citizens, met the call of his maker at 3 p.m. Thursday. Mr. Olds was always active in civil and social life in this community, having served as trustee of the village board of Wyanet for fourteen years and as chief of Wyanet fire department for twenty-seven years, retiring five years ago when he reached the age limit and was voted an honorary chief for life by the members of the department.

"Mr. Olds was born in Wyanet township Aug. 26, 1872, and lived his entire life in the community. He was a member of the hardware firm of Olds & Hamilton for twenty-six years. Mr. Olds served as a helper to his father for fourteen years previous to his acquiring a share in the firm of Olds and Hamilton, after the death of his father in 1901.

"Mr. Olds was a kind and loving father, a pleasant neighbor and a loyal citizen, an enemy to none and a friend to all. Although his health had been very poor for the past few years he worked faithfully until a year ago, when he retired. His passing is a great shock to his many friends in and around Wyanet and he will be missed by all who knew him.

"Funeral arrangements have as yet not been completed.

"OBITUARY

"HOWARD OLDS

"Wyanet has lost one of its most beloved and loyal citizens. Howard Olds has closed his eyes in that dreamless sleep from which there is no awakening on this troubled earth. For months he had calmly and uncomplainingly suffered from a devastating illness which slowly wasted away his strength until Death mercifully relieved him Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

"He paused on life's highway almost in the morning of his manhood and while the shadows were still falling toward the West. Loved and loving, brother, husband, father, friend, he was taken just at the point where life's great beauties lay before him. During all his life, one of the busiest of men, he always found time to lend a helping hand, and were everyone for whom he had paused to do some loving kindness, to bring a blossom to his grave, he would sleep beneath a wilderness of flowers.

"Howard was the second son of John Hixon and Anna Belle Krimmel Olds, and was born on a farm three miles south of Wyanet on August 26, 1872. When he was seven years old, he moved with his parents to Wyanet where he lived until his death. He was educated in the Wyanet public school. When he was sixteen years old, he went to Galesburg to learn the tinner's trade and after

three years entered his father's hardware store in Wyanet to ply his trade. After the death of his father in 1901, he entered partnership with W. H. Hamilton, and from then until about a year before his death continued in the hardware business at the same location. He was forced to retire last June because of failing health.

"All of his life he was active in local civic affairs and took a keen interest in the political affairs of his state and nation. For twenty-seven years he was chief of the Wyanet Fire Department and served on the Wyanet village board for eighteen years. He also served two terms as tax collector for the township.

"He was united in marriage at Wyanet with Eva Kennelly on May 12, 1897. To this union were born two children, Justin K. Olds, of Marseilles, and Miss Bernadine, at home. Besides his wife and children he is survived and mourned by his mother, Mrs. Anna Belle Olds, of Wyanet, one grandson, Richard Olds, of Marseilles, two brothers Bryant and John C., of Wyanet, and three sisters, Mrs. Monroe G. Whitney, of Couer d'Alene, Idaho, Mrs. Charles Webster, of Portland, Ore., and Mrs. George Dahl, of Wyanet.

"Howard Olds will be more than missed, not alone by his family but by all who knew him. His life was an exemplification of all that is good and who lesome and kindly. In his home life he personified to a remarkable degree the noblest type of husband, father, brother and son. In his community he was the sort of man to be pointed out as an example of right living to the young generation. He was indeed one of Nature's noblemen. He sleeps but his memory lives and will continue to live in the hearts of all who knew him as long as love, virtue, faith, and righteousness guide our lives. There was -- there is -- no gentler, kindlier, nobler, manlier man.

"Funeral services were held at the residence Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, Father John D. Ring of Princeton, in charge of the services. The large assemblage of friends at the service and the beautiful floral tributes showed the esteem with which he was held in the community. Interment was at the Forest Hill cemetery."

"HOWARD OLDS PASSES AWAY

"Funeral Services Last Sunday Largely Attended (picture of Howard Olds)

"For the past two or three years we have known that our friend, indeed everybody's friend, Howard Olds, was suffering from a stubborn ailment. Nevertheless when news passed around last Thursday afternoon that he was gone it was a distinct shock.

"The funeral service last Sunday afternoon from his former home was notable because of the great throng of people who desired to show their sincere regards for him and sympathy for the bereaved family. Father Ring, pastor of St. Margaret's church, conducted the service, and paid eloquent tribute to the life and memory of his friend. His remarks were based on the 13th chapter of first Corinthians and he showed how in a remarkable degree the life of Howard Olds paralleled that beautiful passage.

"Small, merry, by childhood's law, she spent happy days with her brothers and sisters in the Wyanet home, growing in stature and grace day by day, playing the old games, so well beloved by all children, and learning very many things about this mysterious and wonderful world.

"As a girl, in and out of her home, on the village street, in school and with the other girls, she was always winning and sweet, ready to do her share and quick to appreciate what others had done; a girl the older folks liked to meet and talk with. One might regret that this period of her life was so brief had she not been so happy as the girl-wife of Elmer Sapp. At seventeen this relation might have been a bit trying, but she was even more attractive then before.

- 'Her air, her smile, her motions told of womanly completeness.
- 'An inborn grace that nothing lacks
- 'of culture or appliance.
- 'The warmth of genial courtesy,
- 'the calm of self reliance.' --

all contributed to the charm of this home. Guests came and longed to come again. She gathered here her friends and kept the hearth-fire aglow for her husband.

"When, by and by, a daughter, the baby Gladys, arrived, her heart was full and the radiance of her smile proved her complete satisfaction. Mother and daughter were great comrades and so complemented each other that both were richer, and all their joys doubled. Later, when this daughter became a bride and went to a home in another city, Mrs. Sapp was often "away" for a few days comforting her heart by a little visit in the new home.

"When she became grandmother, her whole nature expanded with the joy of the new and blessed dignity, and now, her life was bound up with these new lives and nothing was too hard to attempt for them.

"But these family duties and joys did not prevent her being interested in the world about her. One so capable could not hide her light under a bushel. She gave freely of her time and strength to every good enterprise of Princeton. The best things attracted her and won her loyal allegiance. She was so dependable. What she promised to do was done. She was resourceful, too, and self-controlled.

"As the president of the Woman's Club, she proved her executive ability and her gracious presence was no small factor in the conduct of its affairs.

"She was beloved of the Friends in Council and the D. A. R. esteemed her a worthy descendant of a noble ancestry. Other social organizations testify to the helpfulness of her membership.

"Of her service of love in the Methodist church, where she was active in all its branches, her associates speak with unbounded praise. She will long be missed there by both old and young.

"But who shall tell of her friends! A great host! In all these various walks of life, she won love and devotion such as come to few. Even those who were not associated with her intimately, knew her worth, and a stranger meeting her on the street felt the day brighter because of the sunshine in her face.

"The splendid bravery of her last weeks was typical of her life habit. Always she kept her trouble to herself. Her joys she shared.

"Death has robbed us of her presence, but her life belongs to us and nothing can take from us the treasure of her lovely memory.

- "NEWS OF DEATH BRINGS SORROW TO ENTIRE CITY
- "Mrs. Edna O. Sapp, One of Princeton's Most Loved Women,
- "Answers Final Summons At Chicago Hospital.

"One of Princeton's best known and most loved women was called to final rest at 12 o'clock Monday night in the Presbyterian hospital, Chicago, when Mrs. Edna Olds Sapp, wife of Elmer Sapp, president of the Bureau County Independent Telephone company, succumbed to an illness from which she had suffered for several weeks. In the hope of regaining her health, Mrs. Sapp submitted to an operation some four weeks ago; but it was the will of her Maker that she should pass on to the reward she most richly deserves for a life consecrated to His teachings, and she resigned herself cheerfully to His will. During the days following the operation, the many friends and acquaintances here awaited eagerly for news of improvement in her condition; and the entire community was saddened when it became known that the end had come.

"In respect to the memory of one who had been so active in the social, civic and religious life of the community, the ladies of the Drama Circle postponed the plays which they planned this week, and the committee in charge of the dinner dance at the Bureau Valley Country club next week indefinitely postponed their event.

"Funeral services were conducted from the home, Park avenue west, at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the Rev. J. E. Fluck of the First Methodist church being in charge. Interment was at the Wyanet cemetery.

"Mrs. Sapp was born in Wyanet on February 14, 1874. She was married on October 15, 1891. Mr. and Mrs. Sapp came to Princeton fifteen years ago, and during her residence here she was a tireless worker in every movement for the betterment of the community. Forgetful of self and ever thoughtful of others, she seldom overlooked an opportunity to be helpful and comforting to those in need or weighed down by sorrow.

"Mrs. Sapp was president of the Women's club at the time she became ill. She also served as president of the Drama Circle, and vice regent of the D. A. R. She was an active member of the First Methodist church, where she taught a Sunday school class of young ladies, served as president of the Woman's Foreign Missionary society and was a member of the guild. In all these organizations, as in her home and among her friends, a cheerful and helpful influence will be missed as a result of her death.

"Mrs. Sapp is survived by her husband; a daughter, Mrs. Warner VanAiken, of Coldwater, Michigan; her mother, Mrs. J. H. Olds, of Wyanet; three grandchildren, Marjorie, Warner Bryant, and Elmer Frederick VanAiken of Coldwater; three brothers, Bryant, Howard, and John Olds of Wyanet, and three sisters, Mrs. George Dahl, Wyanet; Mrs. Charles Webster, Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. Monroe Whitney, Cour d'Alene, Idaho."

14. Blanche Olds. Blanche Olds⁸³, daughter of John Hixon and Anna Belle (Krimmel) Olds, was born 5 Nov. 1876 in Bureau County, Illinois, near Wyanet and died 24 Dec. 1942 at Couer d'Alene, Idaho.

On 3 Dec. 1899, she married Monroe Gesner Whitney at Wyanet, Ill. He was born 7 Nov. 1865 at Limerick, Ill., the son of William Ross and Rebecca Jane (Gesner) Whitney. He died in Couer d'Alene, Idaho, on 13 March 1955. It was about August, 1907, that he moved his family, his parents and his sister from Wyanet to Couer d'Alene, packing all the belongings of two households into a box car.

The following several quotations are from the Bureau County Tribune, Friday, December 8, 1899:

- (1) "Marriage licenses have been issued to the following: Monroe G. Whitney to Blanche Olds, both of Wyanet."
- (2) "The Whitney-Olds Nuptials. At the residence of the bride's parents in Wyanet, on Sunday, Dec. 3, at 1 p.m., Monroe G. Whitney and Miss Blanche Olds, two of Wyanet's most highly esteemed young people, were united in marriage, the ceremony being performed in the presence of only the immediate relatives, by Rev. Wilfred J. Abel, of the M. E. church.

"The dress, decorations, etc., were simple but elegant and tasty. The sumptuous repast served was superior in quality and unlimited quantity. The presents were handsome, serviceable and costly.

"The celebration of this auspicious event in the lives of both was characterized by a warmth and sincerity that attested more strongly than words can tell the high place the contracting parties occupy in the affections of their relatives and acquaintances.

- "A legion of friends, throughout the community, extend to them their best wishes, and hope that in assuming their new relations in life the young couple may realize their fondest anticipations."
- (3) "Those wedding bells spoken of in our last week's letter, sounded on time, M.G. Whitney was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Miss Blanche Olds, at I o'clock, Sunday, at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Olds, the Rev. Abel officiating. There was no one present except the immediate relatives. The bride and groom took the evening train east on the Rock Island railroad."
- (4) "'Ye local' extends sincere and hearty congratulations to the newly wedded couple at Wyanet -- Mr. and Mrs. Monroe G. Whitney. Miss Blanche Olds, daughter of that first-class man in every particular, John H. Olds, is royally descended, having for her ancestors, John Alden and Priscilla Mullen, both immortalized by Longfellow, and also for a great uncle, William Cullen Bryant, one of the world's greatest poets. Both of these young people have refined natures, with pronounced musical and literary tastes, and are admirably adapted to each other."

"A year ago this Winter my brother had hunted the country over trying to rent a farm, but found it impossible to get one, as every one who could was anxious to farm. He finally gave up and sold his stock preparatory to moving into town.

"However, one night he dreamed he had rented a farm near Tiskilwa, a neighboring town, about eight miles distant, a place which he had visited when but a boy, the farm being owned by one named Rhodes.

"The following morning he told his dream to his wife, but thought nothing further of it. About two weeks later he was called up by telephone and asked to come to Tiskilwa to see about renting Mr. Rhodes' farm. On going there he was informed that Mr. Rhodes had died two weeks before. He rented the farm and is living there at the present time.

Blanche became blind at age 50 and was given two years to live. However, she lived for 16 more years -- a cheerful and productive live. She continued to run her household, and she made quilts and ever her own dresses.

Monroe Whitney was self taught after grammar school. He taught himself telegraphy, two shorthand systems, law and accounting. In 1908, he passed the Idaho bar exam with high marks. In 1910, he and a partner started a business college. In 1916, he was elected to the office of probate judge and served 36 years.

"Guy Olds passed away at his home in Peoria, at 12:25 o'clock, Monday noon, succumbing to an illness which kept him to his bed for six weeks, due to kidney trouble. "Funeral services are being held this afternoon at the Peoria residence, under the auspices of Temple lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M. He was married in 1910 to Miss Thirza Kinder of LaSalle, IL, who survives him, together with his mother, Mrs. J. H. Olds, of Wyanet; three brothers, Howard and Bryant of Wyanet, and John of Muscatine, Iowa; four sisters, Mrs. Elmer Sapp, of Princeton, Ill.; Mrs. George Dahl, of Earlville, Ill.; Mrs. Roy [sic] Whitney, of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and Mrs. Charles Webster, of Portland, Ore.

"Funeral services will be held at his late residence at 1:45 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, under the auspices of Temple Lodge, No. 46, A. F. & A. M., of which organization Mr. Olds was a member. The body will be taken to Wyanet for interment, the services there being conducted Thursday afternoon by the Masonic lodge of that city."

Thirza was a daughter of James E. and Anne Grantham Dyball Kinder. She was born 22 May 1876 at Eldercroft Farm, LaSalle, IL, and died 19 Feb. 1951 at LaSalle, IL. She is buried in Rockwell Cemetery, LaSalle, IL. After Guy's death, she returned to the Kinder family home in LaSalle, living there until her death. She did not remarry and had no children. ⁹¹

16. Lucy Wood Olds. Lucy Wood Olds, daughter of John Hixon and Anna Belle (Krimmel) Olds was born 23 Oct. 1879 near Wyanet, IL. She died 23 Feb. 1943. She graduated from Wyanet High School in the class of 1896. On 1 Nov. 1906 (24 Nov. 1904), she married Charles J. Webster who was born 2 Nov. 1879 and died in 1971. They are buried in the Riverview Cemetery, Portland, OR. They had no children.

"Aunt Lucy Olds Webster and Uncle Charles, after living for some years in Colorado, moved to CdA in 1910. Uncle Charles was a pharmacist and worked in a local drug store here, and Aunt Lucy kept the books there. They had a room in a nice rooming house and "boarded out". After 2 or 3 years here, they moved to Portland, Oregon, where Uncle Charles started a dental course and Aunt Lucy taught shorthand until he had completed the course – with considerable distinction. Aunt Lucy could make friends readily and Uncle Charles knew how to be gentle with his patients and to keep them entertained with a steady flow of humor. So he did real well in his dental practice, and also did fairly well in the stock market, getting out just in time in 1929.

"Aunt Lucy died in January 1943 -- about a month after Mother died. I do not know the exact date. Uncle Charles kept house for himself and continued his practice for about 10 or 12 years, then moved to a very nice residential home where he was the liveliest one there. He also had quite a wide knowledge of medicine, subscribing regularly to Merck's Manual and keeping up with it. So he felt he was quite useful at the Patton Home, helping the nurses watch the patients. Shortly after he went into Patton Home. I started asking him over for a week or ten days every summer, would take him to lunch with a different friend of mine, and have a dinner party at home one night for him and those of Aunt Lucy's friends who were still around. Finally -- in 1964 -when he had got both his train schedule and his baggage mixed up, I realized he would not be back next year. He became crippled with arthritis about that time, too, and was worried, because if anybody at the Patton Home missed two meals in the dining room in a row, he had to go to a regular nursing home. A couple of years ago, he got to that point, and, worrying for fear that senility would follow, he asked one of the nurses to become his guardian. He had dreaded the time when he might come to the end of his own resources and have to go on public assistance. That finally happened. But he had always he wanted to die with his boots on -- and he did just that. He adjusted nicely to the nursing home and everybody there adored him, just as they had at Patton Home. He did die with his boots on -- just last Sunday, July 25. I would have gone over, if the guardian had sent me word in time. But I had a letter from her only yesterday, (Thursday.) He had no relatives at all -- except me, and, of course, we were not blood relatives. When he had

come to visit, we would all sit and listen to his constant flow of humor. I always felt that his wit deserved a wider audience than his dental patients and friends. So far as I know, he was the last of my parents' generation of relatives and in-laws—unless Aunt Fanny's daughter Sadie is still living.

"Well, I did not mean to write a eulogy on Uncle Charles. I keep writing lots of things about people you don't know. Just ask me a simple question, and it produces a paragraph." ⁹³

Family history had been my hobby for a long time by 1971 but I had concentrated mostly my <u>ancestors</u>. Somehow, I had just assumed that Charles Webster was dead long ago and it a was surprise to learn that I might have corresponded with him at the time I began active research of the <u>descendants</u> in the Olds and Krimmel families.

"Community Pays Final Tribute to Late John C. Olds

"Methodist Church is scene of impressive service last Thursday P. M.

"On Thursday afternoon the Method ist Church was crowded with relatives and friends of the late John C. Olds. Beautiful music was provided by Mrs. Lee Oloffson and Robert Watson. A fine and appropriate discourse was given by Rev. Brett. At the close of the impressive ritual for the dead by the Masonic brethren of the deceased, who attended the service in a body. The floral offerings in great beauty and profusion were in further evidence of the great love and esteem in which our friend was held by all. A large cortege followed his mortal remains to his last resting place in Forest Hill Cemetery.

"It was a beautiful October day, such as John always loved. We left him there amid a scene of autumnal splendor, tinged not a little with the melancholy that marks the falling year, and the passing of a vivid life.

"Among those from out of town who attended the services were:

"Mrs. Anna Olds, Mr. and Mrs. Milford Olds and son, Charles M., Mr. and Mrs. Austin Olds, all of Chicago, Mr. Robert Olds, of Newark, Ohio, Mr. Justin Olds, of Marseilles, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Guthrie, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Mrs. John Dorman and son, Clayton, of Viola, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Holmes, Mr. and Mrs. Merle Kenney, of Tiskilwa, Miss Amy Robinson, of Ottawa, and other relatives and friends from Buda, Providence, Princeton, and Bloomington.

"John C. Olds was born in Wyanet on July, [no day given] 1882, and died at his home in Wyanet on October 20, 1936, age 54 years.

"With the exception of about 10 years in Muscatine, Iowa, he has spent his entire life in this community. In June, 1914, he was married to Dorothy Guthrie, at Muscatine. To them were born two daughters, Ardeth, now Mrs. Clyde Campbell, and Elizabeth, now in high school.

"He also leaves to mourn his untimely passing, his mother, Mrs. Anna B. Olds; three sisters, Mrs. Myra Dahl, of Wyanet, Mrs. Blanche Whitney, of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and Mrs. Lucy Webster, of Portland, Oregon. He was preceded in death by his father, three brothers and a sister.

"For many years he has been an active member of the Masonic lodge in which he has served as Master, and in other useful and honorable capacities.

"Mr. Olds's short life was crowded with manifold activities. As a skilled artisan he could and did turn off a surprising amount of work. He was essentially an out-of-door man. He loved the woods and waters, flowers and birds. He took time from his sleep, not from his work, to indulge his soul on the beauties and curiosities of the outdoor world.

"As a man among men, John Olds' most emphatic quality was his neighborliness. His time,

skill, and friendly concern were always at the command of those whose lives touched his. Into homes where there was sickness the brought hope and strength; and he carried pall for scores of those who have passed on. This writer does not know what forms his beliefs may have taken, but does know that in his daily life he put into practice the highest ideals known among men.

"As a son, brother, husband, father and citizen no finer example of all-around manhood has ever graced this community."

According to his death record, John C. Olds was born on 8 July 1882 and died of a cerebral hemorrhage due to hypertension on 20 Oct. 1936. He had been a hardware clerk for 34 years. Children of John Cullen and Dorothy (Guthrie) Olds

Uncle George and Aunt Myra had lived in Earlville, IL, for a time but when I first remember them he ran a Red and White grocery store on Main Street in Wyanet. Aunt Myra had a large drawing of the Bryant family tree in her house and I remember trying to draw a copy of it on pieces of wallpaper but never succeeding in making it all fit — one of my earliest experiences with the various formats I've used in my lifetime hobby of genealogy. They were always very kind to young visitors in their home but perhaps preferred the quiet order of their lives alone. Uncle George was always able to entertain me as a child and I sometimes felt he remained the same playful person as I grew older and he did not.

When Uncle George died, it was said that he had no living relatives (somewhat hard for a young genealogical hobbyist to believe.) He apparently was from near Madison, Wisconsin. "Mr. and Mrs. George Dahl left Monday morning for Madison, Wis. They will spend a week or more touring along the hills and vales of his native country." ¹⁰¹

"TISKILWA STUDENT DROWNS YESTERDAY IN HENNEPIN CANAL"102

"Howard Krimmel Sinks to Death near Erickson Bridge While Companions Gaze Helpless at Trage dy"

"Wins Dramatic Prize"

"Young Man Was Honor Student of Graduating Class and Also a Leader in Athletics -- Inquest to be Held Today."

"Howard Krimmel, 20, a member of the graduating class of the Tiskilwa High School, was drowned late yesterday afternoon in the Hennepin canal near the Erickson bridge, northeast of the village. He was swimming with a group of boys and suddenly sank. Before his companions could reach him, life was extinct. The body was recovered a short time later. The drowning occurred about 5:30 p.m.

"The young man was an honor student in his class. He won first prize Saturday at the county literary meet in the boy's dramatic contest. He was also a member of the track team and represented his school in the 50 and 100 yard dashes and also in the running broad jump. He was a son of James Krimmel, a retired farmer.

"An inquest will be held this morning at 9 o'clock by Coroner A. H. Mahn [?].

"The drowning has cast a spell of gloom over the high school, where Krimmel was one of the most popular students.

"Dr. R. B. Hess, who was called in an effort to revive the drowned youth, worked desperately to induce artificial respiration but all efforts failed. Krimmel was an excellent swimmer and a splendid athlete and it is the opinion of the doctor that death resulted from an attack of heart disease. There was no water in the lungs when the body was taken from the canal, it is said, which would indicated that death occurred before he sank.

"Arthur Steimle and Charles Hedrich, who were among the swimmers in the canal when the tragedy occurred, were the first to reach the spot where Krimmel sank and they recovered the body."

"JAMES HOWARD KRIMMEL"

"James Howard Krimmel, only child of Mr. and Mrs. James Krimmel, retired farmers living in Tiskilwa, was born on a farm in Indiantown November 4, 1900, and died near Tiskilwa, May 25, 1921. His death was due to an accidental drowning while swimming in the Hennepin canal.

"After completing the eighth grade in the country school, Howard entered the Indiantown Arispie Township high school in the fall of 1916 and continued with his class for three years. Desiring to specialize in certain branches, he entered, in the fall of 1919, the Bradley Polytechnic Institute in Peoria and while there he became ambitious for a college education and after one year of study in the Polytechnic he reentered high school in Tiskilwa as a member of the Senior class of 1921, and had he lived would have graduated with that class at the end of the present school year.

"Being a fine speaker, he was chosen to represent the high school in the County Literary contest

held in Princeton May 27, at which time he was awarded the first prize in the boys' dramatic contest, thus bringing honor to our high school which is greatly appreciated.

"The funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. B. Cushing, president of the Board of Education of the High School. Mr. Cushing being assisted by Rev. John Porter pastor of the Providence church.

"In beginning his address, Mr. Cushing stated that never had he undertaken a harder task than speaking on this occasion, which had brought such sudden and almost overwhelming grief to our community. With deep emotion he spoke of watching the careers of the students and graduates of our high school; how Howard Krimmel but a few months ago had become a member of a Christian denomination and immediately became a Sunday school worker, teaching a boys' class, and so on being elected township president of the Bureau County Sunday School Association, while, as assistant Scout Master, he had already assumed responsibility of leadership to the younger boys of our village. The large house and the lawn in front was crowded with citizens of our community and every word uttered by a speaker found an echo in the hearts of the listeners.

"Prof. Henson, principal of our high school, mentions loyalty as a prominent characteristic of this good young man. Loyalty to the church of which he was a member; loyalty to the school where he had worked so hard for the honor which he had recently brought to his class, and, may it not be added, devotion to his mother whom he so tenderly loved. He was courteous and polite in all his intercourse with teachers and fellow students. He was strong and athletic, fond of sports and games. With a mind singularly open to conviction, if he made mistakes and fell into error, he was ever ready to acknowledge faults and seek a better way.

"In the beautiful Mount Bloom, with the rays of the western sun flooding the scene, a great throng listened to the brief burial service. Oh! what a wave of sympathy went out to the gray haired father and mother, sitting by in their car and so bravely bearing their sorrow. Turning from the open grave, we look through tearful eyes to our Heavenly Father with perfect trust, for we know that somewhere, in God's great universe, that bright young mind exists and all is well with Howard Krimmel."

"TISKILWA HONOR STUDENT DIED IN CANAL LATE WED. 103

"Exhausted by the exertion of an attempt to swim across the Hennepin canal and back again near the McMahon bridge, north of Tiskilwa Wednesday afternoon, Howard Krimmel, only son of Mr. and Mrs. James Krimmel, sank in the middle of the stream and was drowned in spite of the heroic efforts of his companions to same [sic] him. Howard, who was an honor student in the senior class at Tiskilwa High school and winner of the county boys' declamatory contest here Saturday, was 20 years of age. The entire village and countryside will turn out for his funeral at Tiskilwa today.

"According to testimony taken by Coroner A. H. Malm, at an inquest conducting in May's undertaking parlors yesterday morning, the young man was considered a fair swimmer but his heart was weak and it is believed that he sank as a result of exhaustion.

"Everett Wade, 17, a high school student who was in the swimming party, stated that 12 boys, who had been playing ball on the school grounds, decided to go swimming. They had been in the water about 15 minutes when Ho ward swam across the canal and then started back. As he reached the center of the canal, he called for help and struggled to keep from sinking. The boys hurried to his side, but Ho ward had gone beneath the surface of the water when they reached him.

"The boys tried to get their drowning companion to shore, but he struggled blindly and pulled his rescuers down with him, so that they had to give up their battle after covering a distance of about 20 feet.

"Charles Steimle, 15, another member of the party, stated that Howard was about 40 feet from the rest of the boys when he went down. He said that the water was not cold.

"When it became evident that the boy could not be rescued by his companions, Harold Jardine drove to Tiskilwa and got Wilton Norris at the restaurant. Norris removed his clothing on the way to the canal and started diving for the body at the point where it disappeared. He could not locate it, but with the aid of a log raft and a fishing pole, Howard was found about 30 feet from the shore. He found the body lying prone on,[sic] the bottom of the canal, face downward, in 12 feet of water.

"Dr. Hess, of Tiskilwa, who had been summoned to the canal, used a pullmotor [sic], secured from the Princeton hospital, in a effort to revive respiration. The efforts were unsuccessful.

"Howard was born on a farm in Indiantown township, and had lived in that vicinity all his life. He was popular with his school mates and had a large circle of acquaintances who are deeply grieved by his tragic death.

"The jury found death was due to accidental drowning. Those on the jury were John Bachman, M. D. Curtis, Dr. B. F. Landes, Dr. E. J. Kennedy, Geo. Lieferman and J. L. Brown."

She graduated from Wyanet High School in the class of 1898.¹⁰⁵ On 9 July 1902, she married Harvey Edward Landes¹⁰⁶, son of Franklin B. and Susan Elmira (Nelson) Landes, at Milo, IL. He was born 13 Feb. 1877 in Lagrange, IN, and died 25 Dec. 1955 at the Illinois Research Hospital in Chicago. They lived near Tiskilwa, Princeton, and finally Ashton. They farmed most of their married life. They are buried in the Mt. Bloom Cemetery, Tiskilwa, IL.

"Alden Stinson spent his early years on the Stinson Homestead farm east of Buda. He attended Buda Schools and the Browns Business College at Galesburg. A retired rural carrier, he served route 2 out of Buda and the rural route at Wyanet for a total of 39 years. Best known as "Barney", he was an outdoorsman who enjoyed hunting and fishing and he was an ardent sports fan. He participated in sports in his younger days and later, became a well known baseball umpire in this area. He was an active leader for Little League.

"He took great pride in his hometown, having been a member of the Buda Band, and later, he devoted countless hours to the Buda Volunteer Fire Company, of which he was a member for 50 years, and Fire Chief for 42 of those years. He was responsible for many improvements made in the Fire Dept. over the years, enabling them to win a B plus rating in Volunteer groups and then to work for the much coveted A rating. He was the second man to achieve a record of 50 years in the Fire Co. and was presented with an inscribed gold wrist watch on behalf of the members of the company in recognition of his service to the community at a dinner honoring his 50 years and in [sic] 1945 they gave him a gold Chiefs Badge.

"I'm sure I sound prejiced [sic] but the Fire Co. hasn't been the same since Dad left it --many people tell me so -- but it was his "baby" and not every one has the interest and time that he had to give.

"Altho I know he missed Buda he contributed to live at the Highrise as long as he was able, being one of a group that played cards and pool and acting as a self-appointed tour guide for folks who came to visit there. [Signed] Joyce"

"ALDEN STINSON BUDA -- Funeral services for Alden George "Barney" Stinson, 86, retired Buda mail carrier who died Dec. 4, 1972, were held Dec. 7 in the Taylor Memorial Chapel.

"The Rev. Richard Huckins of the United Methodist Church officiated and Gaile Akin served as organist.

"Pallbearers were Charles Simms, Donald Younggren, Bruce Scott, Frank Simms, Donald Carper and Sidney C. Smith."
