-----Notes and conjectures on the family of Wm. H. Warwick---

The "proven" line begins with the following earliest known record of William Henry Harrison Warwick, from the 1850 census of Knox County, TN, p. 198, taken 13 Nov. 1850:

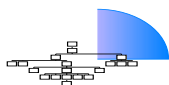
According to Mrs. Idell Warwick, daughter-in-law of Wm. H. H. Warwick, his mother later married a Sharp of Union County, TN. The Knox County marriage records show a Seeleta Warwick m. James Sharp, 13 May 1855, with bond given by J. C. Roberts. There is no indication of her maiden name or former husband. This family is listed in the Union County census records as follows:

I have not found them in the 1880 census, but there was a James Sharp, 66, and his wife Sarah, age 45, in Union County.

Union County deeds, book B, p. 411, contain the record of James and Leatha Sharp selling land in Union County to Orange Warwick, 20 Apr. 1862. This land, in the 5th District, was hers by bequeath and is described as being on Bull Run creek, next to Orange Warwick. It is called an undivided tract of land, indicating that she may have held only part interest. This deed was also signed by W. H. H. Warwick and James Wilson. An identical land description applies to land in the 5th District of Knox County, sold to Orange Warwick by Hayden Warwick, 24 Feb. 1855 (Union County deeds, book A, p. 186). While Union County records help in identifying families of some of the early Warwicks, such as Elias et. al., I found no further clue on the identity of Selita or her first husband. (Consider the possibility that she did not have one.)

The problem is to place Selita (b. ca. 1820) and Polly (b. ca. 1782) in the Warwick families of Knox County. In the 1850 census of Knox County, the neighboring families were #1487, Orange Warwick and wife Jane, and #1488, Haden Warwick. Also listed are Willis Warwick, age 63, b.

The 1840 census of Knox County lists Warrick families headed by Orange, Berry, Willis, and Haden Warrick. If the Polly Warwick family is to be fitted into the 1840 census of Knox County, then they apparently belong in the family of Orange Warwick or Willis Warwick (age 50-60). Neither fit is perfect.

Willis Warwick¹ (1787 - 1866, and said to be son of a John Warwick) married Elizabeth Turner (1786 - 1873) and they were the parents of

Edwin (b. 1806) m. Elizabeth;

 sons were Weston, Tom, Hugh and Willis

Lewis (b. 1808) m. Elmira Lewis;

 in Anderson County in 1850 census. One son was Harrison, b. 1856

Berry (b. 1809), m. Lurane

Preston (1816),

Willis (Jr., b. 1818), m. Elizabeth Lewis

Euell (b. 1820), m. Lockey J.; in 1850 Knox County census

 and perhaps the Elizabeth who m. Huston George.

The parents and several of the children are buried at Old Zion Hill Church at the corner of Hinds Creek and Cardin Gap Roads in Anderson County.

The 1830 census of Knox County lists Wiatt Warwick, age 60-70, with 2 males age 15-20, 1 female 10-15, 1 female 15-20, and 1 female 40-50. Also listed is Willis Warwick, age 40-50, with two males 5-10 (Euell and Emanuel?), 2 males 15-20 (Preston and Willis?), 1 female under 5 (Elizabeth?), 1 female 15-20 (Delilah), and 1 female 40-50 (Elizabeth).

Orange Warwick appears to be too young to be husband or father of either Polly or Selita. His first known marriage was to Dorcas Johnson in Oct. 1837 and he married Jane Johnson in 1845. His first children were Caroline (b. 1838) and Martin (b. 1839).² These two children account for the young children in his household in 1840, so W. H. H. Warwick was apparently not there. Selita is not mentioned.

OTHER NOTES

In 1981, Jeannie Wilmouth wrote me of her opinion that Nancy and Selita were sisters, daughters of Orange Warwick and that James Sharp married Nancy, had Cynthia and Lenville, then married Selita and had James Willis Sharp. Her record of James Sharp in the 1850 census of Knox County showed

When Haden Warwick m. Catherine Sharp on 16 March 1833 in Grainger County, TN, Jas. Sharp was the bondsman. Also, when Haden Warwick m. Barbary J. Johnson in Knox County on 13 May 1846, Jas. Sharp was bondsman.

At the Oct. 1808 session of Knox County Court, the will of Jacob Warwick was probated. Bartley Ream and Wiatt Warwick were to be executors, but Ream resigned and Wiatt was appointed. The will left his Jacob's Elizabeth the "land and plantation where I live ...", 60 acres. The will mentions Sarah and Phebe Warwick, daughters of Wiatt and a grandson Hartwell Brummett, son of Elizabeth. The witnesses were Joseph Swinney, Mary Warrick, William Sharp, and Jeremiah Pate. A codicil added that son John was to get 25 cents as his only share.

An 1812 tax list of Knox County lists Wyatt Warwick as having 60 acres.³ No Warwicks are mentioned in the 1806 tax lists of Knox County.⁴

From Knox County deeds:

Book N1, p. 251: Wint Warwick sold 60 acres on Bull Run to Jacob Warwick for \$200 on 1 Nov. 1808. [After Jacob's death?]

Book O2, p. 411: Willis Warwick sold land in Racoon Valley to Euell Warwick, Manuel Warrick, William Summers, and Sarah Warwick on 19 Jan. 1849. This is the family recorded by Mrs. Silver. Deliah Warwick had married William Summers.

Book R2, p. 326, Andrew J. Hembree of Dubois County, Indiana, made James R. Mynatt his attorney in fact to sell to Orange Warwick "my interest in land in 5th District on Bull Run Creek", 60 acres, 18 April 1853. [Phebe Warwick m. Lewis Embree, 1826]

Book T, p. 283, Samuel Ailor and his wife Sally and James Sharp and his wife Nancy sold to

Orange Warwick "our part of 60 acres on Bull Run" for \$50. This deed, dated 29 Aug. 1837, was signed by James Sharp, Samuel Ailor, Nancy Sharp, and Sally (by mark) Ailor. Sally Ailor was examined separately in 1855! [Sally Warwick m. Samuel Ailor; Nancy Warwick m. James Sharp]

Book Z1, p. 328, Samuel Ailor to Orrig Warwick, 60 acres on n. side Copper Ridge on Bull Run, witnessed by Wiatt Warwick, James Sharp and James Skaggs, Jr.

Book T2, p. 243, William C. Carnes to Orange Wirwick, 40 acres. 4 June 1850, and proved by witnesses Wm. Ledgerwood and Haden Warwick on 12 Feb. 1855

The marriage records of Knox County⁵ list several Warwicks, including:

One wild conjecture (still waiting evidence):

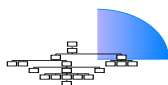
Wiatt Warwick m. Polly Belcher, 15 Nov. 1805, Franklin County, VA. (Isham Belcher was surety.) Wiatt was in Knox County by 1808 (see above). By the 1830 census of Knox County, TN, his age was 60-70 and hers was 40-50. In 1840, they lived with Orange Warwick in Knox County; Wiatt was 70-80; she was 60-70 (?). In 1850, Wiatt was dead and she (Polly, b. VA) was 68 and the grandmother of Wm. H. H. Warwick. If there is any sense in this, maybe this was a second marriage for Wiatt. There may be something in Knox County deeds or estates to support this or perhaps eliminate the possibility. I would also need to show where they were in 1810 and 1820 and that they were not in VA in 1830! We could try to show that Haden and Orange were brothers, sons of Wiatt. Perhaps Nancy and Selita belong in this family, too. Orange Warwick could have been buying his father's land from his own brothers and sisters and there may be more deeds to that effect.

Alternate Conjecture:

The John Warrick who married Polley Lane in Grainger County on 19 Aug. 1799 and appeared

in the 1810 census⁷ there (age 16-26 with 1 female 16-26) could be the missing husband of Polly Warwick in the 1850 census of Knox County. John's wife was b. 1784-1794 and Polly Warwick was b. 1782. I need more on John Warwick and family. There is a widow Mary Warwick, age 30-40, in the 1830 census of Grainger county. John is not in the 1840 census of Tenn.⁸

WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON WARWICK

William Henry Harrison Warwick was born 12 Jan. 1839. On 13 Jan. 1870⁹, he was married to Mary C. Matlock by Bradford Demarcus, M. G., in Knox County, TN. Mary C. Matlock, daughter of William H. and Matilda Matlock, was born 6 Dec. 1853 and died 6 Oct. 1882. Warwick's second wife was Nancy Ellen Wade, daughter of Zion Wade. They were married 26 Aug. 1883 by Alfred Cox, J. P., in Knox County. She was born 16 April 1858 (59?) and died 7 April 1937. Warwick's two wives are said to have been cousins.¹⁰ It may be that Matilda Hickey who married William H. Matlock 22 Jan. 1853 (bond) was the Matilda Wade who married Elijah Hickey 24 June 1841.¹¹ Then, if Zion Wade and Matilda Wade were siblings, Mary Matlock and Nancy E. Wade were first cousins. [CHECK 1850 CENSUS FOR HICKEY.]

Harrison Warwick is mentioned from time to time in the Minutes of the County Court of Union County, 1854-58. Harrison Warwick, James Sharp, and Sam'l Ailor were named to work on the road (p. 157); Harrison Warwick, Samuel Ailor and Charles O. Warwick were named to work on the turnpike from the Knox County line (p. 185); James Sharp was an overseer on the road and among hands were Harrison Warwick, James Sharp, and Sam'l Ailor (p. 270); Harrison Warwick appears again as a road hand (9 June 1858, p. 322); Wiley Warwick and John Warwick were road hands (5 March 1856).

In 1867, Harrison Warwick was involved in a lawsuit relative to his plans to teach a school in Knox County. The court file includes a teaching certificate as follows: "This is to certify that W. H. H. Warwick is capable to teach the following banches [sic] of the English langued. Orthography, Reading, writing, English Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography & Nathal [sic] Polesophy [?]. July 25th 1861, A. Nash, C. Examiner for Union Co." He had made a proposal as follows and collected "Names of Emploirs" on it.

"I. W. H. H. Warrick proposes to teach a school at sad Bishop[?] School House in the ?? Civil District of Knox County for the time of five months commensing on the fifth day of August 1867 I propose to teach Spelling Reading and Writing for \$?? per month Arithmetick English Grammar Geography Natural Philosophy for \$?? per month. We the Undersind Subscriptions do agree to pay the said W. H. H. Warrick the above named prices and I do further agree to furnish the School House and fuel." W. H. Warwick, Andrew Sharp, and James Sharp signed a \$250 bond in this case on 9 Oct 1867. When judgment was made in favor of Adam Hodges, Matt Roberts and

Jesse Hodges, Warwick appealed and he together with Andrew Sharp, James Sharp and Robt.Hosper(?) posted a \$500 bond on 26 Oct. 1867.

On 9 Sept. 1874, William H. Warwick purchased 179 acres in the twelfth district of Knox County from Julia Karney and John Karney, her husband, of New York, for \$2326. He paid by cash and some notes.¹² In 1883, Zion Wade bought some land and in 1884, he divided it between Wm. H. Warwick (25 acres for \$5) and Wm. H. Matlock (25 acres for \$5)¹³ In 1885, William Smith and Sarah J. Smith, his wife, and John L. Moses sold Lot 46 in Moses' additon to Wm. H. H. Warwick for \$300.¹⁴ On 15 May 1882, Wm. H. Warwick sold to Mary C. Warwick "for \$10 and love and affection I bear my said wife" the land he had from John Kearney and Julia Kearney.¹⁵

Harrison Warwick was a school teacher, Civil War soldier, Justice of the Peace, a member of the school board, and a member of I.O.O.F ("F. L. T." on tombstone). Since I do not know the name or number of the lodge, I cannot get his record. I am told it would not help. He died 31 Dec. 1902. His death notice appeared in the 2 Jan. 1903 issue of the Knoxville Journal and Tribune: "The funeral of the late 'Squire W. H. Warwick, who died Wednesday at his home in the twelfth district will be held today. The remains will be taken from the house at ten o'clock and the service will follow upon the arrival at the Third Creek Church, being conducted by the Rev.Mr. Dance. The burial will be in the Church Yard." His tombstone is in the Third Creek Baptist Cemetery in Knoxville, where the tombstones of his two wives and their parents may also be seen.

In 1903, the first settlement of his estate was made in William Warwick et. al vs. Nancy E. Warwick et. al.¹⁶ William Warwick was given a house and lot at No. 221 McGhee Street in the 9th ward of Knoxville and nineteen and one-half acres in the 12th District of Knox County. James Warwick received a house and lot at No. 309 McGhee Street and 16 acres in the 12th District. Arvie Warwick got sixteen and one-half acres on Clinton Pike in the 12th District. Houses and lots were set apart to Ed, Ella, Oscar, Viola, Emert (or Ernest), Luther, Ether, Herman, and Raymond, in common. "Also what is known as the home place, where W. H. Warwick resided at the time of his death, and which is deed by William Warwick, et. al. and deed is filed and made exhibit "W" to this file, and is filed for the purpose of this case of effecting a division according to the wishes of their father, and is to be put of record when this decree goes down making a division according to a paper purporting to be the will of W.H. Warwick, but on account of being so weak was not signed by him; Lying an being in District No. 12 of Knox County, Tenn., and being the same land deeded by W.H. Warwick to Mary C. Warwick recorded in Book "W" Volume 3- page 406, and also being the same land deeded to W.H. Warwick by Jno. Karney and wife on September 9th, 1874, and recorded in Book "P" Volume three, page 435 and 436. To which reference for specific reference is made, and consisting of 125 acres more or less". Arvie, Ed and Ella were given lots 10 and 11 in Block 15 at Lonsdale in the 12th District. Ed, Ella,

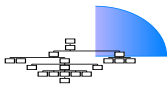

Oscar, Viola, Emert, Luther, Ether, Herman and Raymond got 13.13 acres in the 12th District on Clinton Pike. A plot is included, showing division of land bordering on Clinton Pike and reaching nearly back to 3rd Creek Pike.

On 14 Jan. 1908¹⁷, another court decree was issued in the matter of Ed. Warwick et. al. vs. Luther L. Warwick et. al. Nancy E. Warwick, widow of the intestate W. H. Warwick, was entitled to homestead and dower in the lands of which Ed Warwick, Ella Whitlock, Oscar Warwick, Viola C. Warwick, Luther L. Warwick, Ether R. Warwick, Herman L. Warwick and Raymond Warwick each held 1/9 undivided interest. In these papers, Viola is called Viola Byus and Ernest W. Warwick is included in the list of nine co-owners. The court decreed a division in which Ed Warwick, Ella Whitlock, Oscar Warwick, Luther Warwick, and Ether Warwick got separate shares, but Ernest Warwick and Viola Byus got joint ownership as did Raymond and Herman Warwick.

Nancy Ellen Warrick, widow of Wm. H. H. Warrick of County D, 2nd Tenn. Cavalry, was awarded a "pension allowed to Indigent Widows of Soldiers" by the state of Tennessee. The papers with her pension application show that she was born Nancy Ellen Wade on 16 April 1859, m. William Henry Harrison Warrick, b. Union County, TN, 12 Jan. 1839, on 26 Aug. 1883. Warwick was captured at Somerset, Kentucky, March 30, 1863, and was sent 13 April 1863, from the Military Prison, Louisville, KY, to Baltimore, MD, en route for City Point, VA, for exchange. He was received by the Confederate agent at City Point, VA, 22 April 1863. He was again captured near Farmington, TN, 7 Oct. 1863, and was imprisoned at Camp Morton, Indianapolis, IN. He was released from there 11 May 1865, upon taking the Oath of Allegiance to the United States. He was a resident of Union County, TN, with florid complexion, light hair, grey eyes, 6 feet 1 inch tall. Her petition of 30 July 1931 did not name her children, but said there were eight -- "Male 47, Female 45, Male 43, Male 41, Male 39, Male 37, Male 33, One deceased would have been 30".

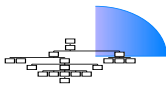
Nancy Ellen (Wade) Warwick died 7 April 1937 and is buried in the Third Creek Cemetery, Knoxville.
